3. A SHORT NOTE ON LAKHPATI DIDI'S TRANSFORMATION JOURNEY

Introduction

Ranapati, a 43-year-old resident of Khekman Gram Panchayat under the Lilong Block in Thoubal District, faced significant financial challenges. Her husband, without a permanent job, struggled to support their family, which included four children. The family often found it difficult to meet their basic needs and provide adequately for their children.

Joining the SHG

In 2021, Ranapati was introduced to the concept of Self-Help Groups (SHGs) by the Pradhan of her area. She became a member of the Chaokhat Khongthang SHG under the Pandam Village Level Federation (VLF). Joining the SHG opened up new avenues for financial assistance and skill development.

First Loan and Weaving Business:

Ranapati's first significant step was taking a loan of INR 20,000 from the SHG. She used this loan to purchase raw materials for weaving Phee and Phanek, traditional attire of her region. Her skill in weaving coupled with the demand and quickly turned this venture into a profitable business. This success provided her family with a stable source of income.

Expanding into Piggery Farming:

With the initial success in weaving, Ranapati sought to diversify her income sources. She took another loan of INR 20,000 through internal lending from the SHG and ventured into Piggery Farming. This new activity also proved successful, with livestock becoming a valuable asset for her family.

Additional Livelihood Activities:

Besides weaving and piggery farming, Ranapati also engaged in vegetable farming. This activity provided an indirect yet substantial income, further enhancing her family's financial stability. The combination of these livelihood activities ensured a diversified income stream.

In addition to her entrepreneurial activities, Ranapati also became a Bank Sakhi (Cadre) for Khekman Gram Panchayat. This role involved providing banking services to SHG members, facilitating financial transactions, and promoting financial literacy.
